Mexico's rich artistic heritage and thriving art scene make it an exceptional location for a meeting of art history research institute leaders and scholars in art history. This meeting is organized by the Association of Research Institutes in Art History (ARIAH) and the Instituto de Investigaciones Estéticas (IIE) at the Universidad Nacional Autónoma de México. The goal is to improve communication and cooperation throughout the Americas. We especially want to strengthen relationships with researchers and institutions in Latin America.

This meeting offers a unique opportunity to discuss how art history and museum research are changing, focusing on the complicated social, political, and financial situations that affect our work today. It is also a moment to recognize and celebrate the important contributions of scholars, curators, and artists in the Americas. Many of these people are already working in our institutions, making important and necessary changes to the discipline.



We will address key questions that speak to the current challenges and possibilities facing our discipline:

- In light of the current global climate, persistent lack of financial support from governments, and increasingly restrictive immigration policies, how can research institutes collaborate to better support professionals in the history of art and related disciplines? This includes academics, curators, artists, writers, conservators, media specialists, librarians, and numerous others dedicated to the preservation and study of visual production.
- What strategies and tools can research institutes adopt to ensure their resilience in such times of crisis? Furthermore, how can ARIAH provide meaningful support to those most affected by the lack of funding given the political environment?
- How can ARIAH facilitate the establishment of meaningful and lasting partnerships and collaborations with institutions in Central and South America?
